Amidst the rubble of Jerusalem and the ashes of God's house, Jeremiah sings this song of trust! What is the reason the prophet has for hope? Grace, and grace alone!

SECOND LESSON - 2 Corinthians 8:1-9,13,14

So powerful is God's grace that God himself gave up every appearance of majesty and glory. He did not need material goods or earthly honor--grace was sufficient to strengthen and motivate Christ to endure all things for us. That same grace is active in the lives of those made rich by Christ's poverty. Christians share grace when they share the gospel. They show the power of Christ's grace when they share material blessings even if it means temporary suffering for self on behalf of others.

And now, brothers and sisters, we want you to know about the grace that God has given the Macedonian churches. 2 In the midst of a very severe trial, their overflowing joy and their extreme poverty welled up in rich generosity. 3 For I testify that they gave as much as they were able, and even beyond their ability. Entirely on their own, 4 they urgently pleaded with us for the privilege of sharing in this service to the Lord's people. 5 And they exceeded our expectations: They gave themselves first of all to the Lord, and then by the will of God also to us. 6 So we urged Titus, just as he had earlier made a beginning, to bring also to completion this act of grace on your part. 7 But since you excel in everything—in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in complete earnestness and in the love we have kindled in you—see that you also excel in this grace of giving. 8 I am not commanding you, but I want to test the sincerity of your love by comparing it with the earnestness of others. 9 For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sake he became poor, so that you through his poverty might become rich.

13 Our desire is not that others might be relieved while you are hard pressed, but that there might be equality. 14 At the present time your plenty will supply what they need, so that in turn their plenty will supply what you need. The goal is equality.

GOSPEL LESSON - Mark 5:21-24, 35-43

When Jesus had again crossed over by boat to the other side of the lake, a large crowd gathered around him while he was by the lake. Then one of the synagogue leaders, named Jairus, came, and when he saw Jesus, he fell at his feet. 23 He pleaded earnestly with him, "My little daughter is dying. Please come and put your hands on her so that she will be healed and live." 24 So Jesus went with him.

35 While Jesus was still speaking, some people came from the house of Jairus, the synagogue leader. "Your daughter is dead," they said. "Why bother the teacher anymore?" 36 Overhearing what they said, Jesus told him, "Don't be afraid; just believe." 37 He did not let anyone follow him except Peter, James and John the brother of James. 38 When they came to the home of the synagogue leader, Jesus saw a commotion, with people crying and wailing loudly. 39 He went in and said to them, "Why all this commotion and wailing? The child is not dead but asleep." 40 But they laughed at him. After he put them all out, he took the child's father and mother and the disciples who were with him, and went in where the child was. 41 He took her by the hand and

said to her, "Talitha koum!" (which means "Little girl, I say to you, get up!"). 42 Immediately the girl stood up and began to walk around (she was twelve years old). At this they were completely astonished. 43 He gave strict orders not to let anyone know about this, and told them to give her something to eat.

M: This is the Gospel of our Lord. C: Praise be to you, O Christ!

SERMON – Romans 15:5,6

May the God who gives endurance and encouragement give you the same attitude of mind toward each other that Christ Jesus had, so that with one mind and one voice you may glorify the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ.

"May God Give a Spirit of Unity"

Do you recall in the months following the attacks on the World Trade Towers in 2001 the many tributes, expressions support, and outpouring of national grief and anger? Though it was a traumatic event, it did have a positive influence on the people of America. I have a particular recollection of a billboard on Hwy 29 west. There was a picture of a crowd of people, but the focus was on a man with a small girl on his shoulders and she was waving an American flag. The billboard said simply: "Unity. Pass it on."

On the July 4th nearly twenty years on from 9/11, would you say that unity is characteristic of America today? What happened? Some disunity is the natural result of time-fading memory. In twenty years, a number of people have been born who have no connection with the event and its aftermath. There have been a couple contentious national elections. The multitude of opinions about Covid have fractured us. There's work to be done in America to regain unity.

You have lived through some months of challenges in the congregation. Multiple factors can be attributed as causes. But if things break down it is our responsibility to rebuild unity and a team spirit.

But God grants us help. St. Paul leads off this text with a description of God, "the source of patient endurance and encouragement." These are valuable commodities if trying to build a congregation. But best is the ability of our God to give a spirit of unity among all believers. Whether or not a congregation has any problems, it is valuable to see what the Lord can do for us.

As St. Paul encourages us to develop and/or rebuild Christian unity, as with America as a whole, there could be racial division. There remains the divide between the haves, and the have-nots. There are political preferences that are developed somewhat by our past experiences. There are those who have the power to lead, and those who are consigned to follow.

All of the above can be present within a Christian congregation. There can be members with different racial backgrounds. That isn't the case currently with Our Savior's, but it could be if we were to be blessed in our evangelism efforts. You note encouragement to modify our attitudes on racial differences in some of the hymn choices today. But since it's not a primary challenge for now, let's leave that aside. There are different political points of view among us. The responses to COVID-19 brought that out all across the Wisconsin Synod, it wasn't a local issue only. But today I wish to focus on the dynamic of challenged to lead and challenged to follow.

Some may say that unity happens when there is absolute equality in the church—no leaders, no followers. First of all, a pure democracy is impossible, or at least, highly inefficient. If you've studied the Greek beginnings of democracy, you have to wonder how they got anything done. But second, even God, who says we must respect and honor each other as equals in salvation—and above us in consideration of needs—God not only speaks of leaders within his church but makes provisions for leaders to take charge. There will always be leaders and always be followers.

During their first missionary journey, we are told that Paul and Barnabas "had elders elected," (Acts 14:23 footnote) in the new congregations they established. Leaders come to the fore because the congregation voted them in. This does not prove the superiority of a leader; he wouldn't be leading if the congregation didn't choose him.

The Lord does speak of certain individuals "with gifts of administration." Yet God has given all kinds of gifts to all kinds of people. You may be a leader, but not a good teacher. You may be a leader, not an evangelist. We need all these gifts and more, for a congregation to work properly. Understanding that he has been elected and that his gifts are not greater than any other should preserve a humble, unifying spirit in a leader.

If so, what will a leader think of his followers? Our text excellently puts it in proper perspective. Who's following whom? St. Paul speaks of God granting a spirit of unity, the NIV put it, "as you follow Christ." Certain people may be called leaders, but nobody's in front except Jesus. If a leader turned around and saw many people behind him, he might be tempted to think what a great leader he is. He needs to turn back to the front and see that they're not following him, they're following Jesus.

That's an important reminder for me. Yes, a call puts me in front of you visually, but still behind Jesus. Sermons need to be about Jesus. Bible class needs to be about Jesus. I pray that God grants me consistency in holding Jesus before your eyes. It is a reminder for council members. Leaders are given authority and responsibility, but they're still serving Jesus. That's the key for anyone leading a congregation.

For this reason, Jesus told his disciples: "The kings of the Gentiles lord it over them, and those who have authority over them are called Benefactors. But it is not to be that way with you," (Luke 22:25,26). An improper attitude is to lord leadership over others. Such a leader is no longer following Christ but his own path. And someday he may look behind and find no followers. They kept following Jesus.

And give Jesus credit for being a follower, too. After all, Jesus was following the instructions of someone else. His Father said go down to earth and live the righteous life of obedience to all his laws. This Christ did since we were not living in accordance with the will of God. Every time we push our way to the fore is setting aside God's will for us. Jesus humbly served.

We might also mention that he served us. In a sense he was following our needs; that our desperate straits led him in his life choices. He followed a path not to get his own good, but ours!

Ultimately this led Jesus to the cross to give up his life as the perfect sacrifice. This, too, was a following, for he famously spoke to his Father, "Not my will, but yours be done." Christ is our leader, but he is an excellent follower.

This realization will prompt the person elected to lead to faithfully fill his role. St. Paul's encouragement back in chapter 12 of this same letter was: "if (the gift) is leadership, be diligent." But it is always part of "offering ourselves" to God (12:1,2).

It is the utmost concern to "glorify the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ." In view of his great mercy in Jesus, all Christians want to glorify God. Jesus' willing life for us, leads us all to a life for him. If leaders know that they are no better than anyone else, we won't have leaders making their noise over here, and followers making their noise over there. Rather, as our text declares, "with one mind, in one voice, (we) glorify" God.

Now, for one mind and one heart to function together, some have to follow instructions.

How do followers get to be followers? One explanation is that if leaders are elected to lead, then followers become followers because they didn't elect themselves to lead. They became followers because they choose to follow.

But a better explanation is that followers have been given the gift of following. In this letter, St. Paul encourages, "If (a person's gift) is serving, then serve."

How many people would think that following—or serving—is a gift? Don't most people believe that you only follow because you haven't been promoted to be leader yet?

Imagine a world of leaders without followers. Leaders would have many brilliant ideas—but nothing would ever be accomplished.

All the automakers have design personnel on their staff. These individuals think up new car concepts and designs. But they still need an engineering crew to turn these super ideas into a workable car. And they still need the factory workers to put that car on the road. Do you think Elon Musk makes the cars or the SpaceX rockets? It takes a special person to bring vision into reality.

Most Christian congregations have leaders who think up new plans and programs, or how to use old programs more efficiently. But it still takes the gifted server to put these ideas into action. It takes an effective follower. And that is a gift from God!

It's jumping the gun a little bit but think of what goes into phenomenal Christmas celebrations. It takes all kinds of servers to pull that off!

It takes teachers to prepare the children to sing or recite. We need altar trimmers and tree trimmers, and artists, who make the sanctuary beautiful. It takes musicians and singers who rehearse special music. It takes a few more hours for the secretary, or as is often the case, many volunteers to assemble the special bulletins, or service presentation screens; an organist to limber their fingers for those beloved Christmas tunes. Will we have a meal, or even a few after-service desserts this upcoming holiday season? It'll take someone—or some-ones—to assume that. You want glory for God? When we all pull together it happens. To borrow a phrase, it takes a village.

A non-holiday service like this still has more people involved than you might first guess. I didn't program the air conditioner. I didn't pay the light bill. I didn't clean the carpets and the pews. I didn't print the bulletins; Maybe I should do a few of those things too, but the point is, it takes a lot of people to just to facilitate worship. And this congregation loves its school. Who's been here early in summer and will be back late in order to have the building ready for kids?

This perspective has a great, positive effect on Christian unity and glory to God. The school isn't for me, it isn't for most of you. But we support it and make it happen for others—for the kids. If a person's gift is serving, let him/her serve!

If both leaders and followers understand that we are working for each other, or for someone else entirely, we won't have leaders in this corner making their own noise, and followers in that corner beating a different drum. Rather with one mind and one mouth we will sing our song of praise together to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ.

I know that we had a challenge to going the same direction. We won't be foolish enough to think that we will never have differences of opinion in the future. But "may God, the source of patient endurance and encouragement, grant that you agree with one another in accordance with Christ Jesus, so that with one mind, in one voice, you may glorify the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ." AMEN.
