First Lesson - Jeremiah 23:1-6

Consider the damage done by false shepherds with false teachings. May God give us faithful shepherds who pasture the flock with the righteousness of Christ given in his pure Word. May that Word raise up a flock that delights in the saving truth.

"Woe to the shepherds who are destroying and scattering the sheep of my pasture!" declares the Lord. 2 Therefore this is what the Lord, the God of Israel, says to the shepherds who tend my people: "Because you have scattered my flock and driven them away and have not bestowed care on them, I will bestow punishment on you for the evil you have done," declares the Lord. 3 "I myself will gather the remnant of my flock out of all the countries where I have driven them and will bring them back to their pasture, where they will be fruitful and increase in number. 4 I will place shepherds over them who will tend them, and they will no longer be afraid or terrified, nor will any be missing," declares the Lord.

5 "The days are coming," declares the Lord, "when I will raise up for David a righteous Branch,

a King who will reign wisely and do what is just and right in the land.

6 In his days Judah will be saved and Israel will live in safety.

This is the name by which he will be called: The Lord Our Righteousness.

Second Lesson – Ephesians 2:13-22

Christ offers a great miracle! He has effected a reconciliation that for us was impossible, a reconciliation with God made at the cost of his own blood. May we all believe, teach and confess the cornerstone of Christ Jesus as the source of the Christian Church.

But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far away have been brought near by the blood of Christ. 14 For he himself is our peace, who has made the two groups one and has destroyed the barrier, the dividing wall of hostility, 15 by setting aside in his flesh the law with its commands and regulations. His purpose was to create in himself one new humanity out of the two, thus making peace, 16 and in one body to reconcile both of them to God through the cross, by which he put to death their hostility. 17 He came and preached peace to you who were far away and peace to those who were near. 18 For through him we both have access to the Father by one Spirit. 19 Consequently, you are no longer foreigners and strangers, but fellow citizens with God's people and also members of his household, 20 built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the chief cornerstone. 21 In him the whole building is joined together and rises to become a holy temple in the Lord. 22 And in him you too are being built together to become a dwelling in which God lives by his Spirit.

Gospel Lesson - John 20:19-23

In his Easter evening appearance, Jesus encourages his disciples and gives them a chance to be strengthened in their own faith. But building them up alone is not the ultimate goal. He then sends the disciples out with the message of the crucified and risen Lord. They need to strengthen others.

On the evening of that first day of the week, the disciples were together behind locked doors because of their fear of the Jews. Jesus came, stood among them, and said to them, "Peace be with you!" 20 After he said this, he showed them his hands and side. So the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord.

21 Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you! Just as the Father has sent me, I am also sending you." 22 After saying this, he breathed on them and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit. 23 Whenever you forgive people's sins, they are forgiven. Whenever you do not forgive them, they are not forgiven."

This is the gospel of our Lord.

SERMON - John 20:19-23 "Play on God's Team!"

In the next few days, most NFL training camps will have begun. Many teams will go into the year with high hopes. The Chiefs, Buccaneers, Packers, and Bills intend to build on their success. With good draft picks and new coaches in some places, even lower ranked teams expect good things. We'll see what the season brings...

But imagine the camps are over and we're at the first official game. The coin is tossed, and the home team wins. They elect to defer until second half and kick away now. Following the kickoff, the defense does a pretty good job of holding the line and forces the other team to punt.

Now fans are eager to see their team's offense come out and "show their stuff." A murmur grows in the stands as there's a delay—no offensive unit comes onto the field. The officials come over to the sideline while the crowd begins to chant: "We want offense!" But the fact is, they don't have an offense. Their only goal was to keep the other team from scoring! Can you imagine such a team?

We don't have to imagine it. We need only to enter the upper room where the disciples were gathered. Early in the Christian Church's history, there was only a defensive unit.

Our text says, "The disciples were together behind locked doors because of their fear of the Jews." That night of Jesus' resurrection, the disciples only concern was protecting themselves. Jesus had to come and tell them to unlock the doors and go out. "Just as the Father has sent me, I am also sending you." Defense is important, but offense is also part of the game.

Why were the disciples defense-minded? With their leader captured and killed, they were afraid the Jews would go after Jesus' followers next. If they got away with beatings and a crucifixion once, wouldn't you fear they could get away with it again? The disciples' fear was realistic.

Their fear was compounded by confusion. St. John honestly reports—even about himself—that they had heard the reports of Jesus' resurrection, and had found the tomb empty, but "they still did not understand the Scripture that (Jesus) must rise from the dead," (20:9). Confusion amplified fear.

So, they gathered in what might be called a "support group". I imagine that they spent a good deal of time telling each other what they remembered of Jesus' words to build each other up. But the strategy was all defensive: protect themselves from invasion by Jewish leaders; build each other's faith. There was no offense in mind.

Are we, the church of today, still in a defensive mind-set? Not because there's fear of being hauled away for torture and crucifixion, but somewhat because defense may be easier than offense?

Offense requires taking risks. In football some go deep, some take short patterns, runners up the middle and the quarterback is relatively unprotected. In order to move the ball down the field, the offense has to risk getting caught behind the line. I'm sure defensive coordinators would disagree, but the defense does not take as many risks. The offense must send many players into enemy territory, while the defense sends a few, but keeps most back in coverage.

If the church plays defense, there are fewer risks. You have very few left out unprotected. I've often wondered how Thomas felt that first night since he was not in the safe house with the others. With a close group, everybody can rush to support each other.

That's the general pattern of church work, isn't it? At a council meeting discussion may be centered around roof repair or tuck-pointing a wall. Maybe some office equipment needs repair or updating. That's mostly designed to support what we've already got going. Those who are part of the church benefit more than those who are still outside.

Don't get me wrong, if we don't practice good stewardship of the building, pretty soon there won't be a place for non-members to come. We have to keep the facility in good repair.

Worship itself might be considered a defensive strategy. By the use of God's Word, we build each other up in faith. By working for each other through school and Sunday school and Bible classes we encourage and support one another. These defensive strategies are important. Without them, we'd hinder our own growth. But a balance is necessary.

When Jesus said, "If you remain in my word..., you will ...know the truth, and the truth will set you free" (John 8:31), he encouraged us to protect what we have. But when Jesus said, "Go into all the world and preach the gospel to all creation" (Mark 16:15), he meant for us to take the offense. "I am sending you," he said. We are to open the doors and go out.

Who's going? It's not too hard to discover—you, me, us!

But wait! There were only 11 disciples in the upper room, right? Only 10 if you remember Thomas wasn't there. And those happened to become apostles', right? The apostles had a special call, special gifts and promise, right? Your average Joe Disciple wasn't given this command, right? Wrong!

First, only eleven in the upper room? Nowhere are we told how many were there. Luke tells us that after Jesus' resurrection about 120 disciples regularly gathered (Acts 1:15). Perhaps some of those 120 were there when Jesus appeared that first Easter evening. Yes, the apostles had a special responsibility to teach and to lead the rest (like a quarterback), but the offense was a team effort.

The Church is still a team. The apostle Peter, in his letters, wrote to all the Joe and Jane Disciples, saying, "You are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, the people who are God's own possession, so that you may proclaim the praises of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light," (I Peter 2:9). Every believer may proclaim God's praises. Think of it this way: your side has the ball. Not your quarterback alone, but your <u>side</u>. Not everyone has it at the same time, but you're all working together.

You have the tools to play this role. Look at the gifts Jesus granted. "He breathed on them and said, 'Receive the Holy Spirit." That means you're qualified for the task.

For what does the Holy Spirit do? First, he gives faith. Through the Word of God, the Holy Spirit makes believers in Jesus Christ. The Bible declares: "No one can say, 'Jesus is Lord' except by the Holy Spirit," (I Corinthians 12:3). When the Holy Spirit is given, he prompts people to say with Thomas, "My Lord and my God!" Personal faith in Jesus is given by the Holy Spirit.

The Spirit has a second gift. Jesus recognized the reality of the disciples' fear, and their preference for defense. So, he encouraged them, "Whenever they arrest you and hand you over, do not worry beforehand what you should say. Say whatever is given to you in that hour, because you will not be the ones speaking; instead it will be the Holy Spirit," (Mark 13:11). The Holy Spirit certainly has the skill to say what needs to be said. If you're sent out, you're qualified, because you've been given the Holy Spirit.

Jesus has also given the message. It's part of this text: "Jesus came, stood among them, and...showed them his hands and side." The message is: Jesus is alive! Now, that needs to be fleshed out a little bit. What does it mean that Jesus is alive? It first means that Jesus was dead. Why did he die? Not because the Jewish leaders hated him, but in fulfillment of Scripture. "He <u>let himself</u> be counted with rebellious sinners. He himself carried the sin of many," (Isaiah 53:12). A quick summary of basic Christian truth? All people sin; Jesus died for our sins; Jesus is alive as proof of our forgiveness.

That's why he could come to his disciples and say, "Peace be with you!" He brought them peace. By sacrificing himself for our sins he ended the battles with God. Peace rules. Having been given peace, you are best qualified to go and proclaim it.

So, what's the game plan? In a well-run football offense, you rarely have everyone in the same place at the same time. Some are running these patterns, some are running those and some stay back to protect the quarterback. As you play on God's team, where are you going?

Currently death and retirement claim about 50 of our current pastors every year. So, we need about that many graduates from our seminary every year just to keep even.

Our Synod would like to open 10–20 new missions every year, even more if possible! We don't want to be only on the defensive, merely holding the line. We want to be on the offensive, going forward, reaching further. That means we need young men to begin training now so that when harvest fields open up, pastors are ready to fill them.

Count your sons, grandsons, nephews and grandnephews as those to be encouraged toward pastoral ministry. Age should not be held against them. Every year a few men enter "second career" training, starting a little later but ending in the pulpit nonetheless.

There are other good options for careers, I know. Let me tell you about Eric Zimmerman. He was a young man invited by the Los Angeles Rams I believe, their first time around in that city, to their training camp to compete for a roster spot. He chose to continue training for the ministry. The Lord took him home after only a few active years as a parish pastor (I believe he had an undiagnosed heart problem). What if he had died on the football field? Talented, paid well, but fewer chances to bring people to Jesus. We've all got other options than public ministry.

Teachers are always needed as well. About 120 new graduates are needed each year to fill the classrooms we have. But in this also we don't want to just hold the line. We want to reach out and go further. China may be our next major mission field where education offers greater access into the society than churches.

When Jesus says, "I am sending you," where might you be headed? Local evangelism always needs willing voices. Last weekend, we were told that an effective evangelism line may be the simple: "Do you have a pastor?" No great knowledge is necessary to bring a person into contact with another who may be the bridge to heaven for them.

There are also other important helping roles. In football, the guards and tackles rarely handle the ball, but they help move it. Their blocking schemes open up paths for others.

Well, if you aren't the spiritual ball handler, you can be a blocker—through prayer. By pleading with God for the success of his Word, you can block the devil and his plans. By giving your support and encouragement, you strengthen others to carry the ball a little farther. Your role may not be as glamorous but try playing 10 against 11 football. We need a full offensive unit on the field—and that means everybody!

The game is in progress. It's called life and there will be a final gun for believers and non-believers alike. What's God's game plan? Said Jesus, "I am sending you." You're the team. Play on! AMEN.
